Ariston Site

Survey Results

In our last newsletter and on Twitter and Facebook we asked you to vote n the top three suggestions as to how local residents would like to see what should become of the Lower Heath. THANK YOU to the 99 who expressed a preference. The result was very close:

- A Sports playing field for use by youth and public 36%
- B Measured running/walking trail including some exercise equipment 31%
- C Venue for community events 32%

Draft Greenspace Action Plan for Beech Bottom Dyke

BBD was formally adopted by FoBH last year (2012) and this year is the centenary of the legislation that now protects Scheduled Ancient Monuments such as the dyke. We marked the adoption and the centenary on 2 June 2013 with a walk along part of it, shared such information as is known and then indulged in speculation about the past.

The latest published thinking (May 2013) about the dyke is that it is a free standing work built at the time of the second Roman invasion (AD43) – perhaps as an outer defence for Verulamium, but there is still no hard archaeology for any interpretation. Over its history it has been used as a road, a very unsuccessful field defence in the Wars of the Roses in 1461, and as a rifle range from the mid 19th century to mid 20th centuries. Antiquarian and other speculation is that it was an Ancient British chariot racing track or part of an inland waterway system.

Its eastern end was cut off by the railway line in the 1860s but it now2 enjoys the highest level of statutory protection, including from metal detecting. The mature native trees are also protected.

The local authorities are now consulting about options for improving access and interpretation while retaining its biodiversity and at the same time promoting and protecting its heritage value. FoBH are pleased to be engaging with this. If you want to find out more about the dyke, then FoBH has a leaflet for sale so please contact us.
